

Foremost are the commanding officers from the five branches of the United States armed forces, who granted the players time from duty to come to Australia. The United States Military Sports Association provided tremendous financial assistance, which allowed this tour to become an affordable reality. Nancy Purdin of MVP Travel in Tucson, Arizona, worked tirelessly to coordinate the tour's many travel plans. Capt Lewis Bumgardner, U.S. Marine Corps, assisted in designing this program which Ed and Loretta Downey generously published. Finally, a heartfelt thankyou goes out to CDR Jerry Gallion (USCG-ret.), who, as the head coach of the Combined Services Team from 1985 to 1990, is credited with building the team to its current high level of ability.

## United States Military Rugby

Military rugby in the United States is a player's game. The 86 military clubs registered with the Combined Services Committee of the United States of America Rugby Football Union are kept alive by active-duty military players who coach and administer their teams. U.S. military clubs exist in Germany, England, Japan, the Philippines, Guam, Panama, Hawaii, Alaska, the continental United States and on several ships at sea. Because no military rugby league yet exists, each of these clubs plays within the local union where it is geographically situated.

U.S. military rugby gets its players from three sources. First, there are players who joined the military with rugby-playing experience. Usually these players learned rugby while attending college, but more are now joining the military with high school experience. The second source is players who learned rugby at the various military service academies: the U.S. Military Academy, West Point, N.Y.; the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md.; the U.S. Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colo.; and the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, New London, Conn. Each of these academies supports a healthy rugby club which plays against other college teams. The third (and largest) source of players for U.S. military teams is active-duty personnel taught by their local military club. The majority of U.S. military rugby teams are composed of these homegrown players who enjoy less than three years' rugby experience. The mixture of experienced and new-to-thesport players produces an exuberant style common to all U.S. military rugby teams.

Each of the five U.S. military services faces a unique challenge in encouraging rugby to grow as a sport. The Army and Marine Corps are attempting to build their programs from the ground up through on-base competition in intramural leagues. The Navy and the Coast Guard depend on their service academies and the talents of high-caliber military players who are members of civilian clubs. The Air Force has a large number of bases in remote locations far from active civilian clubs. Like the Navy and Coast Guard, it monitors the skills of its academy players, and is currently

attempting to build on-base teams to improve the performance of its top players. All of the services, by operating together through the Combined Services Committee, share friendly competition and support each other's efforts.

Since 1980 the Combined Services
Committee has published a quarterly
newsletter and helped sponsor coaching
clinics. Annually, the committee hosts a
club championship in May and an
interservice select-side competition in
September. Since 1984, the committee
has also sponsored an overseas tour (held
every two years) to raise the performance
level of U.S. military rugby. The 1984,
1986 and 1988 trips were to Great
Britain. With the 1990 tour of Australia,
the United States Combined Services
Team soars to the greatest height of its
10-year existence.

## Rugby in the United States

The national governing body for rugby in the United States is the United States of America Rugby Football Union, Ltd. called USA RUGBY. Below the national level, rugby in the United States has three levels of management: club, local Union and territorial. Counting the three independent unions and four overseas military rugby unions as a part of USA RUGBY, the 1311 rugby clubs in the United States are organized into 41 local unions and four territorial unions.

The four territorial unions the local unions divide themselves into are Rugby-East, Midwest, Western and Pacific. These territorial unions oversee the operations of the clubs, referees discipline, tours and competition in their area. The territories organize individual players into selectside teams for annual competition at the National All-Star Championship held in late May and oversee a club championship which begins in October and concludes in early May. By observing players during these two competitions the national team of the United States, the Eagles, is selected.

The two largest parts of United States rugby are the 413 city clubs and 392 college clubs. Masters rugby for players 35 years old or older is supported by 129 independent sides. Women have 162 clubs which compete among themselves at a high standard of play. High schools field 101 teams for boys age 18 or younger across the United States while 28 professional schools support teams. Proudly, 89 military rugby clubs take part in USA


RUGBY.

Of the local unions, New England is the largest, followed by Northern California, Eastern Pennsylvania, Metropolitan New York and Southern California. It is worth noting that Boris Karloff, of movie fame, founded the Southern California Rugby Union in 1935.
